The team continued with the implementation of planned activities at both facilities and in the communities. As a result, a total of 2,241 (M-895, F-1346) beneficiaries were served and documented on both folders and the NOMIS platform.

2,203 (M-895, F-1346) beneficiaries were newly enrolled for OVC services bringing the total number of beneficiaries to 6637. The team successfully tracked back VC who had an interruption in treatment (IIT) to care at National Hospital Abuja and successfully facilitated the transfer of a CLHIV from Asokoro District Hospital to Funtua General Hospital Katsina for ART, TB, and OVC services.

Other activities include treatment of a vulnerable child, provision of transport logistics for drug pickup and sample collection for seven (7) VC across different health facilities, Better Parenting meeting with a total of 10 (M0, F10) caregivers in attendance at Iddo Pada community, Dreams club activity and ASPIRE strategic weekly review meeting.

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# COMMUNITY ACTION AGAINST DRUG ABUSE

It is essential to provide healthcare workers with the appropriate skills and knowledge to ensure the delivery of highquality and inclusive healthcare services.

Through the Nigeria Youth **Futures** Fund Project\_CAADA, CFHI trained ten (10) community primary healthcare workers from Bwari LGA, FCT and seven (7) health students public from **ASSAS College of Health Science** and Technology, Azu Garua Niger State. The training focused on the treatment and provision of health and psychosocial support to victims and survivors of drug and substance abuse.

The 4-day training will aid the healthcare workers in providing high-quality, compassionate, and person-centred care to victims and survivors of drug and substance abuse.
