# BENEFITS OF BREAST FEEDING





  - Every little bit helps to make a difference.






### **ELIMINATING HEPATITIS: PRIORITIZING** AWARENESS AND EARLY DETECTION


On July 28, 2023, the Centre for Family Health (CFHI) hosted virtual Initiative а commemorating World Hepatitis Day (WHD) in Nigeria. The theme of WHD 2023, "We're Not Waiting, Hepatitis Can't Wait," served as a powerful call to action, urging participants and the government to take swift action towards eliminating viral hepatitis in the country. Over 70 participants joined the Twitter Space discussion to learn from healthcare professionals and specialists about hepatitis care.

the disease, educate individuals on prevention faced by individuals with hepatitis. The methods, encourage testing and screening, and panelists emphasized the role of healthcare advocate for enhanced access to treatment to professionals help people understand the illness, reduce their education, and destigmatization, creating a chances of getting it, detect it early, and get the supportive environment for those affected treatment they need to stay healthy.

During the discussion, the panelists provided valuable insights into the different types of viral hepatitis, including A, B, C, D, and E. They explored how each type is transmitted, its symptoms, and the potential long-term health effects. They stressed the importance of prevention strategies, including vaccination against Hepatitis A and B, safe injection practices, proper hygiene, and promoting safe sex practices. The emphasized the importance of early detection through testing and screening for hepatitis. They informed participants about diagnostic methods, such as blood tests, that are available. The panel also advised participants to encourage their loved ones to take advantage of free testing opportunities.

## ACTION TO SUSTAIN PRECISION AND INTEGRATED HIV RESPONSE TOWARDS EPIDEMIC WAIDS Program team CONTROL (ASPIRE)

The ASPIRE HIV/AIDS Program team continued to provide high-quality services to beneficiaries, and they also made progress in advocacy and mobilization.

The team served a total of 2,950 beneficiaries. They conducted 19 new enrollments and provided nutritional and assessments for risk 305 and caregivers. They also transportation logistics for 11 caregivers to pick up their medication and collect samples. Tracked back to caregivers who had an interruption in treatment and additionally provided community Family Index HTS to 80 beneficiaries in Jiwa and Sabo Lugbe communities.

Continuing with unwavering dedication, each of the three Self-Help and Income Generation (SILC) groups from diverse communities persisted in their valuable contributions. Thanks to the team's proactive advocacy and effective mobilization efforts, the chief of Sabo generously provided complimentary space within community for a caregiver to establish her business. Additionally, the team's impactful initiatives extended empowering three adolescents, enabling them to enroll in skill acquisition programs for hairdressing in Wumba and hair barbing in Dape.

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


## WORLD DAY AGAINST TRAFFICKING IN PERSONS - COMBATING HUMAN TRAFFICKING IN NIGERIA

### "God sent CFHI to liberate my household from poverty, I am forever grateful to CFHI" ~ Ama

A reactive widow with 3 children including a CLHIV. After the demise of her husband, she was empowered through the IHVN household economy strengthening and she started selling Plantain in her rented shop. The profit from the business wasn't enough to cater for her Household or renew her rent so she was kicked out of her rented shop.

In FY 2023, CFHI linked her to the FCT Social Development Secretariat (SDS-FCT) where she was empowered with a grinding machine. Without a space to set it up, CFHI reached out to the stakeholders in her community through the monitoring advocacy and mobilization of IGA, resulting in her being given free space in the community, where she happily started her grinding business.

She continued selling her plantains in the same location, and with the earnings from her grinding business, she expanded her operations by introducing the sale of potatoes and retail charcoal. In the evening, she also roasts corn in that same space.
