break down barriers and create a community that stands united against HIV/AIDS.


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ACTION TO SUSTAIN PRECISION AND INTE-GRATED HIV RESPONSE TOWARDS EPIDEMIC


The team has been actively engaged in several community activities. The ASPIRE team received mentorship training from IHVN during IHVN monthly supervisory

visit in the office. CFHI served a total of 4752 individuals, conducted nutritional assessments for 213 Vulnerable Children (VC), and carried

educational mance assessments for 211 VC. Additionally, recorded 12 new enrollments for OVC services, provided transport logistics for drug pickup and viral load sample collection, and successfully tracked a VC who had interruptions in treatment (IIT) back to care. In the area of Household Economic Strengthening (HES), five Savings and Internal Lending Communities (SILC) groups made financial contributions. within the reporting period.



WORLD DIABETES DAY 2023



To commemorate World Diabetes Day 2023, CFHI held an Instagram event aimed at raising awareness about diabetes, educating the audience on prevention and management, and facilitate real-time engagement with the participants. The event took place on November 14, 2023.

The highlights of the event encompassed comprehensive discussions covering various aspects of diabetes, including its types, symptoms, risk factors, and lifestyle modifications. By addressing these key elements, CFHI aimed to provide the audience with a well-rounded understanding of diabetes, emphasizing both preventive measures and effective management strategies. The speakers delivered concise yet valuable information to the audience.

The event reached over 80 accounts, with a total of 150 impressions, indicating a significant online presence and the potential impact of the campaign. These effort will contribute to the broader goal of increasing public knowledge about diabetes and promoting proactive measures for prevention and management.

International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women and Girls



Centre for Family Health Initiative in collaboration with National Agency for Prohibition of Trafficking in Persons (NAPTIP) commemorated the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women and Girls at Iddo-Padda community on November, 25. The event took place at Iddo-Padda due to the high number of VAWG cases recorded in the community within the past few months. We had a Door-to-Door education campaign and reached over 500 women, men, girls and boys. The primary focus of the event was to raise awareness and address the issue of violence against women and girls. The Door-to-Door education campaign proactive approach was to reach the community members directly in their homes which allowed for a more intimate and personal engagement with the residents of Iddo-Padda.

CFHI and NAPTIP combined resources, expertise, and networks to enhance the effectiveness of the intervention allowing for a more coordinated and impactful initiative.







Orange Road Walk



Centre for Family Health Initiative participated in the Orange Road walk to kick start the 16 Days of Activism at Eagle Square . The event had several government and non governmental organizations in attendance.
