

ACTION TO SUSTAIN PRECISION AND INTEGRATED HIV RESPONSE TOWARDS EPIDEMIC

The Centre for Family Health Initiative (CFHI) successfully implemented the OVC program in the Abuja Municipal Area Council (AMAC) of the FCT during the FY23 period, with funding from PEPFAR through the IHVN ASPIRE Project. The program aimed to enroll and provide interventions to 8,300 Orphans and Vulnerable Children (OVC) and caregivers but we surpassed our target by 0.5%. The interventions included health care services, nutritional support, education, vocational training, psychosocial support, social and legal support, household economic strengthening, gender norms implementation, better parenting skills training, support for adolescent girls and young women, and the establishment of a DREAMS-Club for girls in different communities.



Socio-economic empowerment

A total of fifteen (15) adolescents, sponsored by CFHI, are currently undergoing training through Monitoring Advocacy and Mobilization activity for IGA/Skills acquisition, in tailoring, hairdressing, catering, and pastries for free, showcasing the power of community in empowering youth and building brighter futures.











(Not real names)- Hanatu's family, facing financial hardship, received support from CFHI, not only in healthcare but also in economic empowerment, ensuring sustained health improvements. Similarly, Yusuf, a reactive caregiver, experienced a turnaround in her family's economic situation through CFHI's interventions, including health support, nutritional counseling, and a substantial economic boost. Annie, a widow struggling to support her children, utilized CFHI's funds for income-generating activities, elevating her family's financial status and fostering stability. These narratives underscore the pivotal role of household economic strengthening within the OVC Program, demonstrating how targeted financial assistance empowers families to break free from economic challenges, fostering self-sufficiency and improved wellbeing.

COMMUNITY ACTION AGAINST DRUG ABUSE (CAADA)

The Nigeria Youth Futures Fund implemented the Community Action against Drug Abuse project, which was funded by the MacArthur Foundation and Ford Foundation and implemented by CFHI in collaboration with LEAP Africa. The project focusses on raising awareness providing education and preventive measures to reduce drug abuse and its associated negative effects on individuals and the community as a whole.

CFHI trained ten (10) community primary healthcare workers from Bwari LGA, FCT, and seven (7) public health students from ASSAS College of Health Science and Technology, Azu Garua Niger State. The training focused on the treatment and provision of health and psychosocial support to victims and survivors of drug and substance abuse.

Over 200 youths were educated on the dangers of drug abuse and on the need for youths to exercise their civic responsibilities during a road walk at Dawaki, Dutse Alhaji and Dutse Sokale communities.






EDUCATIONAL INTERVENTIONS

Through the year, over 70 children has been impacted through our educational intervention programs. We believe that education is the bedrock of family and society development. A total of thirty-seven (37) children cutting across Junior secondary and senior secondary schools were supported to register for the Basic Education Certificate Examination (BECE) and West Africa Examination Council (WAEC)/National Examination Council (NECO) and JAMB in FCT.





In partnership with Toast Masters International, Sheerah Children Initiative, Jewel Publishers and the Institute for Human Virology, CFHI organized a leadership training for the school prefects of Government Secondary School Kabusa, Abuja. About 25 school prefects were trained and empowered with skills such as goal setting, public speaking, servant leadership, and time management. In addition, over 300 books were donated to the school library.

Also, the Federal Ministry of Women Affairs in collaboration with Centre for Family Health Initiative, Action Against Hunger Nigeria, UNFPA, WaterAid Nigeria, UNICEF, and The Foundation - Focused On FORI Reducing Inequality FederalMinistry of Women Affairs Headquarters, Abuja; and other organizations, celebrated the day at GSS Tudunwada, Wuse zone 4, Abuja. During the event, CFHI donated 100 reusable sanitary pads to support the distribution of sanitary pads to students.



To commemorate World Menstrual Hygiene Day, 2023, CFHI in collaboration with Heal The Youth Foundation and Binyoh, conducted an educational program for more than 75 young girls and boys at Government Junior Secondary School, Burum- Abuja. The program aimed to fight against period stigma. 44 reusable sanitary Safepads were provided to girls with limited access to hygiene products, and educational materials to the boys



The CFHI team ventured into the heart of two communities, Gbaupe and Gui, located in the remote corners of Abuja, to empower and inspire young minds. They also distributed over 65 Reusable SafePads to girls who otherwise lack access to sanitary pads, and sensitized boys about the physical and emotional challenges that girls encounter during menstruation.

The community members in Angwan Shahu community, Karimo, Abuia expressed their challenges in accessing immunization, such as the overcrowded PHC in the nearby town and the high cost of transportation. Therefore, to mark World Immunization Week, the Centre for Family Health Initiative (CFHI) partnered with Idu Primary Health Care facility to immunise over 30 children in Angwan Shahu community to overcome some of their challenges in accessing immunization.



HUMAN PAPILOMA VIRUS VACCINE

INTRODUCTION PROJECT





CFHI participated in the 2-day training for Civil Society Organizations for the Human Papillomavirus (HPV) Vaccine introduction into Nigeria's Expanded program on Immunization (EPI) Schedule.

The training was organized by Johns Hopkins International Vaccine Access implementation with Center its Consulting Direct partners, Logistics (DCL) and Women Advocate for Vaccine Access (WAVA) on October 16/17 at Grand Pela Hotels & Suits, attendance Abuja. Also in representatives FMOH, from NPHCDA.

CFHI trained ten dedicated representatives, one from each of the ten communities in Kuduru Ward to become advocates, educators, and mobilizers for the introduction of the Human Papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine. This vaccine holds the potential to safeguard countless lives against a devastating and widespread health threat.

Our training equipped these community representatives with the knowledge, skills, and tools needed to conduct advocacy, sensitization, and mobilization efforts within their respective communities. Their roles extend far beyond mere information dissemination; they are now catalysts for change, actively engaged in the mission to protect adolescent girls.





TECHNICAL WORKING GROUP (TWG) MEETING ON ENDING VIOLENCE AGAINST CHILDREN (EVAC).

FEDERAL MINISTRY OF WOMEN AFFAIRS





On October 4, 2023, our Executive Director, Krystal Anyanwu, Technical participated in the Working Group (TWG) meeting on Ending Violence Against Children (EVAC). The meeting was held at Reiz Continental Hotel in Abuja, Nigeria. During this gathering, the TWG delved into a crucial aspect of their mission by reviewing the Informants Interview Tool for the Costed National and Six States Plans of Action to End Violence

Violence Against Children in Nigeria which represents a pivotal step toward ensuring the safety and well-being of children across the nation.

The meeting witnessed the presence of influential figures, including the Directors of the Child Development Department of the Federal Ministry of Women Affairs, as well as representatives from the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), Ministry of Health, Ministry of Labour, and other relevant stakeholders.

BASIC EDUCATION NATIONAL STAKEHOLDERS' CONVOCATION AND REPORT LAUNCH



The Centre for Family Health Initiative (CFHI) participated in a conference to track the progress of the Lagos State Universal Basic Education Board's (SUBEB) action plans from 2018 to 2020. The event was held in Abuja and attended by various stakeholders,





including government officials, nonorganizations, governmental and representatives from The SUBEB. conference featured goodwill a message from the Director of the MacArthur Foundation, along with impact stories, documentaries, group discussions, and a communique drafting and presentation session. INTERNATIONAL DAY OF ZERO TOLERANCE FOR FEMALE GENITAL MUTILATION (FGM)



The event had 41 females in attendance, and they all appreciated the organization for coming to educate them on FGM and they pledged their support to end FGM in their community.



ELIMINATING HEPATITIS: PRIORITIZING AWARENESS AND EARLY DETECTION

On July 28, 2023, the Centre for Family Health Initiative (CFHI) hosted a virtual event commemorating World Hepatitis Day (WHD) in Nigeria. The theme of WHD 2023, "We're Not Waiting, Hepatitis Can't Wait," served as a powerful call to action, urging participants and the government to take swift action towards eliminating viral hepatitis in the country.



Over 70 participants joined the Twitter Space discussion to learn from healthcare professionals and specialists about hepatitis care.

INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR THE ELIMINATION OF VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN AND GIRLS



CFHI in collaboration with the National Agency for the Prohibition of Trafficking in Persons (NAPTIP) commemorated the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women and Girls at iddo-

padda community on Saturday, 25th November 2023 following a previous needs assessment and frequent reports of rape cases in the community. We had a Door-to-Door education campaign and reached over 500 women, men, girls and boys with fliers ,booklets and stickers highlighting local support services and helplines.



CFHI, NAPTIP and the Primary Health Care Centre Iddo Pada, combined resources, expertise, and networks to enhance the effectiveness of the intervention allowing for a more coordinated and impactful initiative.

CFHI also participated at the Orange Road walk to kick start the 16 Days of Activism organized by Ministry of Women Affairs in partnership with several other stakeholders across F.C.T.







WORLD BLOOD DONOR DAY

CFHI in collaboration with the National Blood Service Commission (NBSC) commemorated World Blood Donor Day at Dutse Alhaji Market, Abuja. In line with the campaign's slogan, "Give Blood, Give Plasma, Share Life, Share Often," about four people who met the requirements for blood donation gave their blood.



INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

Centre For Family Health Initiative commemorated International Women's Day (IWD 2023) at Kabusa Community Abuja with more than 20 adolescent girls reached.

In line with the theme "DigitALL: Innovation and Technology for Gender Equality", the adolescents were lectured on significant women who had made impact in both digital space, and in Other areas of life. They were also inspired to fearlessly pursue the career they so desire and never to undermine their abilities as a woman.



SIXTY-SEVENTH SESSION OF THE COMMISSION ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN (CSW 67)



The Centre for Family Health Initiative in collaboration with Hasso-Plattner-Institute and Forusgirls hosted a side event during the sixty-seventh session of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW67) at SAP, 10 Hudson Yards on March 13, 2023.

As part of CSW67, which aimed to gather global perspectives on advancing gender equality and women's empowerment, our parallel event aimed to foster discussions and strategies specifically addressing the intersection of technology and the well-being of women and girls.

The Co-founder, Princess Osita Oleribe, made a presentation on the role we play in partnership with other stakeholders to ending violence against women and girls in our society.

This initiative underlines CFHI's dedication to driving positive change and leveraging technology for the betterment of women's lives.

DAY OF THE AFRICAN CHILD

The event at Junior Secondary School Gosa was a resounding success, encompassing a diverse array of activities to commemorate the Day of the African Child (DAC) and raise awareness about the digital environment.



included a robust Sessions exploring the pros and cons of the digital environment, addressing topics such as technology's role in skill development and potential drawbacks like limited internet access and its impact on mental health. The talk show, guided by a JSS1 student, delved into essential issues surrounding children in the digital space, including defining a child, exploring the digital environment, and understanding children's rights. The event's educational value was further emphasized during Session 3, CFHI's Communication Manager, enlightened students about their rights in the digital space.



TUBERCULOSIS ADVOCACY AND MID-TERM REVIEW



The Centre for Family Health Initiative participated in the Mid-Term Review of the National TB Strategic Plan (2021-2025). During this evaluation, health facility questionnaires were administered to TB local government supervisors at Nwaorieubi Primary Health Center in Mbaitoli LGA, Imo state.

CFHI also joined the 5-day National TB Advocacy Workshop organized by Stop TB Partnership Nigeria and NTBLCP. The workshop aimed to enhance participant capacity for advocating improvements in the National TB program and increase involvement of those affected by TB. It also focused on strengthening skills in stakeholders mapping and audience selection for advocacy. At the end of the event, a communique was developed.

Amina's (not real name) journey empowerment journey from five bags of pure water in March 2023 to 75 bags marked a significant turning point in her life. Fueling her aspirations, Amina, wise with her savings, expanded her enterprise by adding three crates of mineral water. Not only did this boost her business, but it also enabled her to make a meaningful investment in her child's future, sending them back to school. Recognizing the strength in community collaboration, Amina joined a local savings group. In a testament to her resilience and commitment to progress, she took a transformative step forward by securing a loan from the group, further propelling her entrepreneurial dreams and solidifying her role as a beacon of inspiration in her community.

She sells Plantain in her rented shop. Unfortunately, the profit from the business wasn't enough to cater for her household or renew her rent so she was kicked out of the rented shop.

This year, CFHI linked her to the FCT Social Development Secretariat (SDS-FCT) where she was empowered with a grinding machine. Even with the grinding machine, there was no space for her to set it up.

She was given a free space in the community.

She continued selling her plantain and expanded her business, with the profit from both businesses.

Currently, she is an active member of PROGRESSIVE SAVINGS (SILC Group) in Sabo Lugbe

She can cater to her household needs. Her Household is virally suppressed as she has enough time to care for herself and her son.
